General Comments

Name of operator

A Monitoring Inspection occurred on March 20, 2025.

Children were observed during snack time, as well as indoor and outdoor free play. Proper handwashing procedures were followed during snack. Steps or platforms were provided to ensure children could independently access regular-sized toilets and sinks.

Educators shared that the children are currently very engaged in creating books about their lives with educators, playing actively in the mud kitchen, and interacting with materials and activities designed by educators, such as crochet dolls. Children were also observed exploring various art materials during free play.

Parents of children present at the center are granted entry at any time. Outdoor play occurs for at least one hour in each four-hour block of time when the majority of children are in attendance, weather permitting. A clearly

visible and prominent space is available to display the facility's license, current inspection report, monitoring reports, and any orders for compliance. Meals and snacks are provided at appropriate intervals, with snacks available at least every three hours and meals served at recognized meal periods. The daily routine is posted for reference.

Evacuation procedures are posted in a prominent location. Ideas from learning stories and web-based planning are reflected in various areas, including the art area, library, kitchen, and dramatic play spaces. Books have been carefully selected to align with children's interests. Well-defined learning and play areas were observed, with several pieces of children's artwork displayed throughout the facility.

The facility maintains clean and organized traffic areas, with outdoor walkways free of clutter. Toxic products, including chemical cleaners, are securely locked and inaccessible to children. The diaper-changing area is located within one meter of a sink, with posted diaper-changing procedures visible to staff performing diaper changes. Outdoor stationary equipment is surrounded by protective surfacing of appropriate depth.

The curriculum provides opportunities for both individual and group experiences. Various forms of literacy are present in the indoor environment, and children have opportunities to express creativity, explore the arts and sciences, experience accomplishments, problem-solve, and develop trusting, respectful, and supportive relationships.

A conversation took place with the Operator to discuss the strengths and needs of the facility. Strengths identified included the presence of various forms of documentation throughout the facility, as well as completed webs that have been expanded upon with educator input. Areas for improvement were also noted, including keeping a list of substitutions on the fridge for the menu, posting fire drill records, and implementing a cleaning checklist for the washroom.
