General Comments
A renewal inspection was conducted on July 16, 2026. During the inspection, children were observed engaged in free play and participating in activities that reflected their current interests. Educators were actively interacting with children, providing support, encouragement, and opportunities to extend learning experiences such as creating a book as a group project. Educators and children were collaboratively creating a book based on the children's current interest in Toy Story. Children were observed discussing characters and contributing ideas for the story. Children also shared bookmarks they had created using pipe cleaners and other craft materials to represent Toy Story characters, demonstrating creativity and pride in their work. The indoor environment was observed to be well-organized, welcoming, and accessible to children. Low, open shelving allowed children to independently select materials and games. Resources available included board games such as Sorry!, Headbanz, Connect 4, and Pop-Up Pirate. Children's cubbies were clearly labelled and displayed previous artwork, The dramatic play area was equipped with a variety of costumes, dress-up clothing, and props. The art area was well supplied with materials including scissors, glue sticks, construction paper, markers, crayons, coloured pencils, craft sticks, pom-poms, stickers, loose parts, recycled materials, tissue paper, and other open-ended creative resources. Materials were organized and readily accessible to support independent exploration and

creative expression.

Lunches and snacks were observed during the inspection and were brought from home. Educators advised that, once per week, children participate in preparing a special snack at the centre, providing opportunities for participation, skill development, and social interaction.

The washrooms were observed to be clean, sanitary, and fully stocked with soap and paper towels. The program's first aid kit was reviewed and found to be complete, accessible, and appropriately maintained.

The parent information board was reviewed and contained all required documentation, including the current licence, licensing contact information, emergency evacuation procedures, inspection reports, and other required licensing information. Required documents were displayed in a manner that was easily accessible to families.

Licensing also completed a follow-up review of the outdoor swing set. The previously identified concern regarding exposed bolts has been addressed, and the exposed hardware has been removed. As a result, the swing set was found to be in compliance and may now be used by children.

As a precautionary measure, two rugs located within the main play area were observed to be lifting at the edges, creating a potential tripping hazard. Licensing recommends laundering and drying the rugs to help flatten and restore their shape or replacing them if necessary to eliminate the hazard and maintain a safe play environment.

One educator does not currently hold a valid first aid certification. This non-compliance was previously identified during the monitoring inspection and remains outstanding. The educator must not be left alone with children.
