General Comments

A Monitoring Inspection occurred on January 16, 2025.

Children were observed engaging in indoor free play. The environment reflected the children's interest in National Penguin Day, as there were penguin-themed art and activities available. Additionally, Grade 8 students participated as buddies, reading with and playing alongside the children. Some children were also observed creating long chains using links and exploring measurement with a measuring tape.

Educators demonstrated positive child guidance techniques throughout the facility. They engaged with children at their level, provided appropriate supervision, and used encouraging language. Educators also offered children choices and supported them in decision-making processes, fostering independence and problem-solving skills.

The facility was welcoming and thoughtfully arranged to promote engagement and exploration. Parents were granted entry to the center at any time, supporting an open-door policy. Monthly emergency evacuations were completed and prominently posted, and evacuation procedures were clearly displayed.

The room setup was inviting, with materials and activities designed to encourage play and learning. Ideas from the web and learning stories were integrated into the art area, library, kitchen, and dramatic play areas. Books reflected the children's current interests, while several well-defined learning centers, such as those for building, reading, dramatic play, and science, provided diverse opportunities for exploration. Children's artwork was displayed throughout the facility, celebrating their creativity and accomplishments. The curriculum supported a range of learning experiences, offering children opportunities to express creativity, explore the arts and sciences, solve problems, and build trusting, respectful relationships.

During the inspection, a conversation with the administrator revealed that the facility will not be submitting a license renewal and is scheduled to close in March 2025. Plans are in place to communicate transparently with families, offering support and resources to help them navigate the transition to alternative childcare arrangements.
