General Comments

A Monitoring Inspection took place on October 8, 2024. Children were observed engaging in indoor play, and proper handwashing practices were followed during the transition to snack time.

Educators have incorporated their personal interests into their documentation, showcasing a commitment to reflective practice and engaging with the children's learning experiences.

The daily incident log is maintained and up to date. Outdoor play is provided for at least one hour within each four-hour block, weather permitting, ensuring children have ample time for physical activity. A clearly visible area is available to post the facility's license, current inspection reports, monitoring reports, and any compliance orders. Evacuation procedures are prominently displayed. Well-defined learning and play areas were observed, with numerous pieces of children's artwork displayed throughout the facility. All toxic products, such as cleaners, are securely locked and inaccessible to children. Drinking water is provided throughout the day, and infant bottles are properly labeled for individual use. The infant outdoor play area is either separate or used at different times to ensure a safe and appropriate environment for younger children.

Multiple forms of documentation were evident throughout the facility, with efforts to extend the curriculum outdoors and integrate nature into classroom activities. Webs created with the children have been expanded upon collaboratively with educators. A conversation with the Operator highlighted both the strengths and needs of the facility. Strengths included unique centers based on the interests of both children and educators, integrating outdoor elements into art experiences, and well-organized portfolios that represent the children's learning and link daily activities to the New Brunswick Curriculum Framework.

However, several areas for improvement were also discussed. These included enhancing the play-based curriculum with more open-ended art activities, introducing visual schedules in each classroom to engage children as co-creators in daily activities, posting learning stories in visible areas for families to read, and labeling bins with both pictures and text to support children's independence during cleanup time.
