General Comments

On July 30, 2024, a Monitoring Inspection occurred. The facility was on outbreak, resulting in the closure of the infant room. During the visit, educators were actively sanitizing and cleaning all surfaces and materials.

Children were observed during indoor free play. Educators mentioned that the children are currently very interested in being active outdoors. They were observed using positive language and giving gentle reminders to the children.

Parents of children present at the center are granted entry at any time. Outdoor play occurs for at least one hour in each four-hour block of time when the majority of children receiving services are in attendance, weather permitting. The school-age room is set up invitingly, with materials arranged to encourage play. The facility had a varied supply of appropriate equipment, materials, books, and toys, and several learning centers, including building, reading, and dramatic play, were available. The sensory area is well-equipped, with sand, water, and other materials in sufficient quantities, along with accessories that are provided and rotated regularly. Toxic products, such as chemical cleaners, are locked and inaccessible to the children. Drinking water is provided throughout the day. The infant outdoor play area is separate or used at different times than other children, and outdoor stationary equipment is surrounded by protective surfacing of appropriate depth.

Opportunities for individual and group experiences are open to the children. A conversation took place with the Administrator regarding the strengths and needs of the facility. Strengths identified include sensory
