Comments: During the follow up inspection the Quality Assurance Monitor observed that the daily activities were purposely planned and documented. Deficiency is now compliant.

Comments: While awaiting the final number of children present, the operator indicated that the attendance sheet needed to be completed and that a copy for the week needed to be printed. The Quality Assurance Monitor discussed with the operator that attendance sheets are expected to be completed as children arrive at and depart from the facility. It was noted that some children had been present for approximately 20 to 30 minutes, and that some children had already departed, prior to the attendance being completed. The importance of completing attendance records in a timely and accurate manner was discussed. The operator shared that attendance sheets are typically printed in advance and noted that they were unaware that no copies were available on that day. The operator also explained that the educator arriving with the first group of children usually completes the attendance sheet and stated that, on this occasion, the attendance had not been completed. The operator expressed that the educator may have experienced some stress due to the presence of the Quality Assurance Monitor, which may have contributed to the attendance sheet not being completed. The Quality Assurance Monitor reiterated the importance of maintaining accurate attendance records and discussed scenarios in which attendance documentation is essential. The operator acknowledged this discussion and indicated that a system would be put in place to ensure attendance sheets are available and ready for use at all times. Deficiency is now compliant.

Comments: During the follow-up inspection, the Quality Assurance Monitor observed that the operator had printed copies of an incident report in preparation for potential use. Deficiency is now compliant.

<p>Comments: Upon arrival at the facility, the Quality Assurance Monitor asked the educator how many children were present. The educator reported that there were nine children. During a headcount, the Quality Assurance Monitor observed eleven children in total, with nine in the main room and two children in the washroom at the back of the building. When asked about the two children in the washroom, the educator indicated they were not aware the children were there. The Quality Assurance Monitor discussed the importance of remaining aware of both the number and location of children at all times and reiterated that children must not be left unsupervised.</p> <p>When the second group of children arrived at the centre, the Quality Assurance Monitor asked the operator how many children were present at that time. The operator indicated that the attendance needed to be completed in order to determine the final number. The Quality Assurance Monitor received the final number of children present at approximately 3:40 p.m., about 20 minutes after all children had arrived at the centre. The Quality Assurance Monitor discussed the importance of consistently knowing how many children are present at all times.</p> <p>Deficiency is now compliant.</p>			

General Comments

The Quality Assurance Monitor was on site to conduct a follow up inspection.

During the inspection, the Quality Assurance Monitor observed that children were lined up in the hallway for approximately five minutes, during which time they became restless. The Quality Assurance Monitor asked the educator why the children were waiting for an extended period. The educator explained that the children were waiting to wash their hands; however, two children had already washed their hands and were seated eating their snack and couldn't be left alone.

The Quality Assurance Monitor noted that the two children had not followed instructions and had gone to wash their hands ahead of the group. It was further noted that the remaining nine children should not have been required to wait for another educator to arrive before proceeding to wash their hands. The Quality Assurance Monitor advised that the two children who had already washed their hands should rejoin the group so that all children could proceed to the washroom together. The educator then escorted all children to the washroom to wash their hands.

A subsequent discussion took place regarding handwashing procedures and children returning to play while waiting for others to finish washing their hands prior to snack time. The Quality Assurance Monitor reminded the operator of the importance of handwashing immediately before eating and that children should not return to play between washing their hands and eating. The Quality Assurance Monitor also advised that one educator should be present in the eating area while another supervises children washing their hands, and that children may be sent directly to the eating area once handwashing is complete.

The operator indicated that this is the usual practice; however, due to a staff absence that day, they were unable to follow their regular routine. Following this discussion, the operator directed an educator to supervise children in the eating area who were ready to eat.
